Welcome to Beverley Chamber Music Festival



New Paths is honoured to have been entrusted with the running of the Beverley Chamber Music Festival; in the festival's quarter-century history it has welcomed an exceptional roster of artists to the East Riding, and we look forward to building on its excellent reputation nurtured by the outgoing committee.

Pianists Martin Roscoe and Libby Burgess are now Co-Artistic Directors of the festival, and it is apt that they present a joyous programme of duets (Friday lunchtime) to launch this partnership, as well as performing together in a concert for the primary schools of Beverley (Wednesday morning).

Friday 28th September is St Wenceslas' Day, the annual autumn celebration of the Czech patron saint, and so this year's festival has a distinct Bohemian flavour, from Suk, Martinů and Janáček, to two of the great chamber works by Dvořák: his A major Piano Quintet (Martin Roscoe and the Doric Quartet, Thursday evening) and E flat major Piano Quartet (Libby Burgess with the Wieck Ensemble, Saturday evening).

The name New Paths is inspired by the musical friendship and collaboration between Schumann and Brahms (the former writing his famous 'Neue Bahnen' article to proclaim his younger colleague to the world), so we are pleased to feature both composers in our programme, and to explore other pairings of inspiration and friendship – Franck and Ysaÿe, and Bridge and Britten. Schumann encouraged Brahms, and Brahms in turn championed Dvořák – which brings us full circle to this year's Bohemian celebrations, represented especially in our design by the Czech lion taking the place of the Beverley beaver!

We are thrilled to be returning to St Mary's, one of the most beautiful churches in the land, for the festival, and greatly look forward to welcoming you there in September.

If I only knew...

Moray Welsh - cello Martin Roscoe - piano

Bach - Sonata No. 2 in D major BWV 1028 Martinů - Variations on a Slovak Theme H378 Brahms - Sonata in E minor Op. 38

This programme is bookended with Bach, in his own sublime D major Gamba sonata, and in Brahms' brooding, vigorously contrapuntal E minor sonata which (like the Ysaÿe yesterday) was heavily influenced by Bach. In the middle of these works is the Czech composer Martinu's dance-inspired Variations on a Slovak Theme, that theme being the folksong 'Ked bych ja vedela' -'If I Only Knew...'. Cherished by the festival audience, this is sure to be a very welcome return of illustrious cellist Moray Welsh with Martin Roscoe.

Dies Irae

Janáček - Violin Sonata Schumann - Violin Sonata No 1 in A minor Op. 105 Ysaÿe - Sonata for Solo Violin Op. 27 No. 2, 'Jacques Thibaud' Franck - Violin Sonata in A major

Dutch violinist Liza Ferschtman is one of the most compelling and exciting performers in the world, and

we are honoured that she and Martin Roscoe open this year's festival in a stunning programme of war and peace.

Janáček's dark 1914 sonata launches our Czech theme. and is paired with Schumann's romantically churning A minor sonata. Eugene Ysaÿe – known as 'The King of the Violin' - was inspired by the music of Bach to write six sonatas for unaccompanied violin, each dedicated to a different violinist: the Thibaud sonata prominently features the Dies Irae plainchant from the Catholic Mass for the Dead.

Of the many works written for Ysaÿe to perform, Franck's Sonata is amongst the most popular; this sunny and virtuosic work ends gloriously in an ecstatic canon of wedding bells.

Dumka

Doric String Quartet, Martin Roscoe - piano

Bartók - String Quartet No. 5 Haydn - String Quartet Op. 33 No. 1 Dvořák - Piano Quintet No. 2 in A major Op. 81

The Doric String Quartet have firmly established themselves as the leading British string quartet of their generation and we are delighted to welcome them to Beverley for two concerts this week. They begin their spell at the festival with Bartók's haunting fifth quartet in which his 'Night Music' style conjures up the sound of the Hungarian countryside in the evening with bugs, birds, and things that croak!

The nucleus of this epic work is a lively Bulgarian folk dance. Czech folk music features prominently in Dvořák's exuberant Piano Quintet No. 2 - one of the glories of the genre - which ranges from the expressive Dumka to the virtuosic Furiant, Between the Bartók and Dvořák we hear the first of Haydn's suave Op. 33 'Russian' Quartets

STMARYS BEVERLEY

St Mary's Church is home to the Beverley Chamber Music Festival. For many years the festival has been privileged to present its concerts in the nave of this exceptionally beautiful medieval church - the acoustic and size of which make it a superb chamber music venue for audience and performers alike.

Beverley has been renowned for music since the Middle Ages and St Mary's is adorned with many musical carvings, the most impressive of which are the colourful 'minstrels' overlooking our stage.

The minstrels were installed during the rebuilding of the church in the 1520s, after the tower collapsed. As part of that rebuilding the gold stars which look down over our musicians and audience were added to St Mary's ceiling. An entire star chart of the Northern Hemisphere can be found on the ceiling of the vestry (which serves as the dressing room during the festival!).

Today St Mary's sits at the heart of Beverley's handsome 'Georgian quarter' on the memorably named street, North Bar Within. Through the gate at the end of that street lies North Bar Without and some of the town's grandest houses. Opposite the church is the Beverley Arms Hotel which is currently undergoing an extensive redevelopment and is scheduled to have reopened by the time of the festival

St Mary's newest musical carving was added in 2017. One of the pinnacles on the north nave clerestory was badly decayed and in a dangerous state. Thanks to a grant from the Heritage Lottery Fund that pinnacle was restored and made safe. The grotesque at the foot of the pinnacle had been lost completely (the stonework had eroded) and so a new grotesque was carved a beaver playing the harp! We hope that festival goers enjoy looking at the new carving. The vicar of St Mary's, Rev'd Becky Lumley, writes "Beavers are symbolic of the beginning of new works and this is a potent symbol of our desire to see the rest of the church restored". The church is seeking to raise the £5 million needed to restore its crumbling stonework.

New Paths is immensely proud to be part of the life of St Mary's and it is pleasing that this new chapter in the history of the Beverley Chamber Music Festival begins as work to safeguard the future of the church gets underway. We hope to fill this glorious building with music for many years to come.

Talk: What harbour shelters peace?

The festival spans works from very early to very late in Benjamin Britten's life. Recognised not just as one of the great British composers of the twentieth century, but of all time, Britten was an extraordinary artist and craftsman. A child prodigy, an internationally reputed composer and performer, and a fascinating troubled individual, there is much to explore as we put tonight's programme in context.

There is no more appropriate time to discover Britten than against the background of a festival: his founding of the Aldeburgh Festival in 1948 exemplified his belief that music should be available to all, with some of the 20th century's greatest musicians joining him in halls and churches in the small Suffolk town he had made his home. La Serenissima

Doric String Quartet

Haydn - String Quartet Op. 33 No. 5 Britten - String Quartet No. 3 Schubert - String Quartet in G major D887

The Dorics continue their survey of Haydn Op. 33 from last night, this time with the characterful G major quartet, nicknamed 'How do you do?', for the elegant four-note theme which recurs. The two great late string quartets featured in the programme are by Schubert and Britten, often considered like-minded composers despite the century between them.

Britten's third quartet was his last completed major work, written during his final illness, and completed during his last visit to Venice, while Schubert's epic, gripping G major quartet was written towards the end of his life and published only posthumously. The quartet's recording of this masterpiece on the Chandos label has been cited as one of the best releases of 2017

Mozart's tempestuous G minor piano quartet opens this concert, given by Libby Burgess' Wieck Ensemble. Following yesterday's exploration of late Britten, here we turn to one of his early works, the gritty Phantasy Oboe Quartet, and mirror it with the elegiac Phantasy Quartet for piano and strings by his teacher, Frank Bridge.

To close the festival we return to perhaps the best-loved of all Czech composers, Dvořák, and follow the Piano Quintet in A major of Thursday night with his joyful and beautiful Piano Quartet in E flat major.

Seats in the centre blocks are numbered, and the staff at the Beverley Tourist Information Centre will help you choose the best seats. Seats in the side aisles are unreserved, and some have a restricted view of the stage – you can choose the best available for yourself.

Refunds

We regret that refunds can only be given if the concert is sold out and we are able to sell on the ticket. Please note that there will be a 10% administration charge.
